This year we are delivering five youth focused projects and developing plans for the SYPS now a broader programme of projects entitled Slamming It!. Two meetings a year held remotely vis skype or zoom, whichever is easiest for folk, approximately an hour in length.

You will be asked for your feedback and insight into the development and delivery of the conFAB youth focused projects Your ideas for youth focused projects will be greatly welcomed There are also a range of possibilities to take part in the delivery of conFAB youth focused projects as a volunteer or in a paid position

Fee: you shall receive £70 for taking part in the steering group paid in two instalments of £35 following the remote meetings, paid directly into a bank account

You can remain on the steering group for as long as you like up until you reach the age of 26.

conFAB YOUTH ARTS PROJECTS

Slamming It!

Is a national programme of participatory arts focused around poetry which aims to provide opportunities for young people to explore their voice and develop essential life and employability skills and consist of:

Scottish Youth Poetry Slam 2020: Twelve groups of young people from across Scotland will take part in workshops and live events competing for the title of Scottish Youth Poetry Slam Master 2020.

Workshop Facilitation Apprenticeship: through a yearlong programme of training, shadowing and supported delivery young people will gain skills that will enable them to seek employment as or work as a freelance workshop facilitator. We will work with 6 young people.

Continuing Professional Development Sessions: we will increase understanding of the use of the arts as a tool to engage disadvantaged young people with educators through a series of workshops. We will work with 90 educators.

Out of Harm

Following on from the overwhelming response to the Out of Harm Tool Kit in 2017 Therapeutic Storyteller Wendy Woolfson, Senior Family Development Worker, Quarriers Andrea-Maria McGowan and Artist/illustrator Danielle Banks will collaborate with 10-12-year-old young people to develop an online resource around Self-Harm targeted at 10-11yrs which will include stories they have written and a comic they have developed that raises awareness of Self-Harm for 10-11year olds.
